ALOHA COMMUNITY LIBRARY ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT OCTOBER 2013

INTRODUCTION

The Aloha Community Library began in early 2011 as the vision of a few friends, neighbors and community activists meeting for coffee to discuss the possibility of a community library in Aloha. From that early beginning a ground-swell of community grass roots activism began, bringing us to where we are today.

OUR PAST

From incorporation in 2011 to opening our doors on September 22, 2012, we solicited and received the generous support of the Aloha-Reedville community, and from many libraries in Oregon. Book donations allowed us to open with a collection of over 6,000 items, and sales of extra donated books provided funding for supplies. Other libraries offered us shelves, furniture, computers, and the checkout counter and book-drop. Grants allowed us to start a family reading program in our empty space, before the library was even open. Generous donations from library lovers and local businesses allowed us buy book processing supplies, set up internet access, and to hire our first (and only) paid staff position, the Director of Volunteer Services.

Looking ahead to 2014, we're focusing on:

- Expanding programs, services and hours
- Continuing to build community and business support and seek grants
- Applying for membership in the Washington County Cooperative Library System
- Finding a larger space for the library

Programs and Services

We are beginning to offer after-hour workshops for adults at the library; the first workshop was a card-making workshop by volunteer Betsy Buckel. Watch the newsletter and website for additional workshop.

We received a grant from the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation, and will be holding monthly programs based on the children's books written and illustrated by Ezra Jack Keats beginning in October.

We look forward to expanding the Summer Reading Program this coming year, and offering other programs and special-interest events as volunteers and resources become available.

Community, Business and Grant Support

Until we become a member of the Washington County Cooperative Library System, we rely 100% on donations, grants, used book sales and fund-raising events to keep the doors open and the internet on.

We will be continuing to work with community groups, businesses and individuals to build the sustaining support that will get us to our goal of WCCLS membership in July 2016.

Applying for WCCLS Membership

In order to become part of WCCLS, we must qualify as a Level 3 library before we apply for membership. The deadline to apply for inclusion in the next 5-year library levy cycle is in May 2014, so our focus this year will be on meeting the qualification requirements. These include:

- Increasing our operating hours to 40 hours per week
- Hiring a librarian and increasing our paid library staff to one full-time equivalent
- Increasing monthly circulation to 40,000 item per year (3,333 per month)

Volunteers have given well over 6,000 hours of service in the past year, coordinated and trained by our Director of Volunteer Services, Terri Palmer. Terri's dedication, expertise, vision (and patience) have been instrumental to our success as a volunteer-driven organization.
